Plagiarism

Plagiarism is presenting someone else's work as your own without proper attribution. This includes copying text, ideas, images, or findings from any source. To avoid plagiarism, always use quotation marks for copied text and provide citations for all sources, even if you've rephrased the information.

Cheating on Quizzes, Tests, or Final Examinations

Cheating is any action that undermines fair testing procedures or violates exam regulations. Examples include looking at another student's exam, using unauthorized materials, or communicating with others during the exam. Always follow exam rules and avoid any actions that might be perceived as cheating.

Inappropriate Collaboration

Inappropriate collaboration occurs when students work together on assignments without the instructor's permission. While some collaboration is acceptable, always make sure you understand your teacher's guidelines before working with others on assignments, projects, or labs.



Academic Dishonesty

Contract Cheating

Contract cheating involves outsourcing your academic work to a third party, who completes the assignment for you. This practice is unacceptable and can result in severe consequences. Avoid using contract cheating services or asking friends or family members to complete assignments for you.

Duplicate Submission

Duplicate submission, also known as self-plagiarism, is submitting the same or similar work for more than one course without permission. If you want to use your previous work in a new assignment, obtain permission from your current teacher, expand on the previous work, and cite yourself as a source.

Personation

Personation is pretending to be someone else or allowing someone else to impersonate you in an academic context, such as writing a test or signing an attendance sheet. Personation is considered fraud and can result in severe consequences. Always be honest about your identity in all academic situations.

Academic Fraud

Academic fraud involves falsifying information or documentation to gain academic advantages, such as accommodations for tests or assignments. Examples include creating fake medical certificates, forging signatures, or sabotaging other students' work. Always be truthful and transparent in your academic pursuits.

CONSEQUENCES FOR ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

FACTORS OF CONSEQUENCES

- Grade level
- Frequency of incidents
- Maturity of student
- Was the offense planned or the result of an impulse?
- Has the student been honest and cooperative
- Were other students impacted by the actions of the student?

Consequences will reflect a continuum of behavioural and academic responses based on the above factors.

PROBABLE CONSEQUENCES

Students found committing academic misconduct work will be dealt with as follows:

- *First Instance:* Zero given on the assignment or test
- Second Instance: Removal from the course

What Happens If I Get an Email Pertaining to Academic Dishonesty

Receiving an email regarding academic dishonesty can be a distressing and unsettling experience. However, it is essential to address the situation calmly and understand the process that follows such an accusation. This section aims to guide you through the steps that occur when you receive an email about academic dishonesty.

Review the Issues

Take time to thoroughly read the email and understand the specific academic dishonesty outlined in the teacher email. This may involve identifying the type of academic misconduct, such as plagiarism, cheating, or inappropriate collaboration. Carefully review the provided evidence or examples that led to

the teacher email.

Gather Relevant Materials:

Collect all relevant documents and materials related to the work in question, such as drafts, notes, sources, and communications with peers or instructors. This will help you prepare a response to the teacher email and demonstrate your commitment to academic integrity.

Meeting with the Teacher:

You may be asked to attend a meeting with your teacher to discuss the academic dishonesty issue further. During this meeting, present your response to your teacher's email, provide any additional information, and be prepared to answer questions. Remain calm, respectful, and professional throughout the discussion.

Reflect on Your Actions:

Reflect on your work and actions related to the assignment, exam, or project in question. Consider whether there may have been any unintentional violations of academic integrity, such as improper citation, insufficient paraphrasing, or lack of understanding of collaboration guidelines.

Responding to the Email:

In most cases, you will be given an opportunity to respond to specific academic dishonesty outlined in the teacher email. Craft a well-structured, honest, and respectful reply, addressing each point raised in the email. Provide any supporting data, explanations, or mitigating circumstances that may help clarify the situation. It is crucial to maintain a professional tone and avoid emotional outbursts or accusatory language.

Learn from the Experience:

Regardless of the outcome, use this experience as an opportunity to learn and grow. Reflect on your understanding of academic integrity, improve your citation and collaboration skills, and commit to upholding ethical standards in your future academic efforts.

Remember: honesty will determine the consequences applied.



Learning Check-Ins

InformNet students may be required to participate in a Learning Check-In.

These online meetings are:

- Teacher-initiated Teams meetings. Students are required to meet within 2 school days of the teacher's request.
- Approximately 15 minutes in duration
- Meant to check your understanding of the material covered based on the work you have handed in.

During a Learning Check-In, cameras and microphones are required to be on and you must be prepared to share your screen.

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
